Jewelry Tips

TOOTHPICKS

The round, stronger toothpicks have a multitude of uses on the jewelry bench. I use them for mixing epoxy resin, for applying paste solder, with Zam for polishing in tight spots, and with a bit of beeswax for picking up and positioning small stones. They're particularly good for testing the fit of a small faceted stone in a prong or tube set finding.

PUMICE WHEELS

Pumice wheels are good for touching up a bezel after you've set the stone. The hardness is about 6 on the Moh's scale, less hard than quartz, so it shouldn't scratch any of your jaspers.

However, I'd avoid or be real careful of using pumice near the softer stones like turquoise, amber, howelite, etc. If you're unsure that a wheel is pumice, test it with a piece of glass. Glass is about 5 ½ on the Moh's scale. If it doesn't scratch glass, it shouldn't scratch quartz.

MAGNETIC PIN FINISHER

The person reporting this on the YahooGroups Jewelry Casting list says he's made two units from these plans and they work very well. In addition to the primary job of burnishing and polishing finished pieces, he also uses the units for cleaning investment from castings.

ELIMINATING FLATS By - Ted Robles

A while back, someone was saying that he was having problems with getting "flats" on his cabs, that there was insufficient "give" in his wheels, and it didn't seem to make any difference no much pressure he applied. That was his first mistake. Diamond and corundum are two different animals; relatively speaking, about the same difference between quartz and chalk. If you "lean into" a diamond wheel, you will get lousy results (flats, etc) on your stone, and your wheel will wear out long before their time. On diamond, you try to do your cutting (and everything else) by almost not touching the wheel. Use essentially no force. Don't "grind" the stone, let the diamond wear it away, but keep it spinning.

The technique is simply to use the whole face of the wheel, and keep your cab moving. Any time you stop, you just bought a "flat". Can't help it ! It is the same principle as sharpening a knife on an emery wheel. If you don't want notches in your blade, you keep it moving. Do almost all your cutting on the coarsest wheel you have. If you leave any flats on the preform, you are going to have them on the final piece can't help it.

And finally, practice, practice, practice. Machines, like people, take some acquaintanceship before your really know what you can get out of them.



Origin of Banded Agates

Stratigraphic Distribution and Environments of Deposition Relating to the Origin of Banded Agates.

Examination of numerous agate nodules and their Stratigraphic settings shows that they are usually confined to only five lithologies. Examples are: (1) rhyolitic ash flow tuffs, Jefferson Count, Oregon (2) tholeitic basalts, Brewster County, Texas; (3) andesites, Estacion Moctezuma, Mexico; (4) regressive marine carbonates, Platte County, Wyoming; and (5) continental siltstones, Sioux County, Nebraska.

Silica sources for thunder eggs in ash flow tuffs may have been primary (magmatic) and secondary (glass devitrification). In young geologic environments ash flow tuffs and/or ash overlie basalts and andesites which contain no agates. In older geologic environments the tuff and ashes are altered to clays, zeolites, and silica gels. Tuffs and ashes are often absent in very old environments, and the underlying basalts and/or andesites are agate bearing.

Devitrification of ashes yields silica gels that percolate downward, collecting in vesicles in underlying basalts. Spherulitic crystallization is initiated when gels come in contact with minerals, such as carbonates and sulfates from high pH alkaline lakes that formed on basaltic terrane, or oxides from weathering.

Silica for agates in regressive marine limestone may have been organic; however, air fall ash should be considered as a major source as it is for agates occurring in continental siltstones.

Agates are diagenetic products that relate to alkaline conditions, arid climates, paleosols, and unconformities. The terms chert, thunder eggs and agates should not be used interchangeably as each represents a unique geologic setting.



Copyright 1992. Used for non-commercial education purposes. Our next field trip to Texas Springs has some potential hazards that can cause life threatening situations:

Whenever you are digging into the side of a hill an overhang of dirt above your head is created. At times this essential cave you are creating doesn't seem to be a risk because of the thickness of the overhang.

On our scouting trip to Texas Springs last week the soil was quite moist where we were digging. One of the caves we worked on was at least two feet into the digging zone where limb casts were found. The overhang was at least four feet above our heads and moist; with this combination of weight and no support the overhang collapsed just after we had come out from under the dirt ceiling.

At least eighteen inches of soil that was four feet high and about that wide fell into the work area. If you can visualize about two wheelbarrows full of soil landing on your head and shoulders you will get a good picture of how much dirt fell. My guess with the moisture content of the soil and the volume that fell approached or exceeded two hundred pounds. The pictures below illustrate types of landslides that are common. Look at illustration (a), you will see what typified our cave in.
