Jewelry Tips

MOTOR SAFETY - THE LITTLE THINGS CAN BITE

Most jewelers treat motorized equipment with caution. We've all heard stories about work pieces coming loose in the drill press or about getting long hair or clothing caught in the polishing machine. It stands to reason that a machine with a motor of half a horsepower or so is going to win out over its operator. We all know that, and I'm not going to harp on it. That's not the point of this story.

But the point here is with the smaller powered machines we often use, the ones with little 3 inch diameter motors. For instance, these small motors are used in flexshafts and micro buffers. They're so small that many of us forget caution when using them. I'm guilty of it myself sometimes, and believe me it can get you in trouble.

One friend had a polishing bur bend in the hand piece and then whack the thumb that was holding the work piece so badly that it seemed the bone might be broken. The swelling was substantial, and it took several weeks to regain normal use. A small underpowered motor? I don't think so.

Another friend was using one of the small buffing machines, the kind you can stop when you apply too much pressure to the wheel. Not to worry about such an underpowered beast you say. Wrong, it literally jumped up and bit the hand that feeds it! Buffer was set on a low table to do a quick polish, so was not mounted or clamped. A buff was installed on the right spindle, no buff on the left. Friend was wearing a tight-fitting, long-sleeved sweater. While buffing on the right wheel, the left tapered spindle caught a thread on the friend's left sleeve and started grabbing more and more threads and sleeve.

Rather than pulling the arm into the machine, the light buffer quickly lifted off the table and started climbing up the underside of the friend's arm. There was no way to get a hand of the on/off switch because the unit was spinning wildly and battering my friend like a club wielded by a mad man. Only when my friend could grab the gyrating power cord and yank it from the wall did the mayhem stop.

So when you're in the shop, please think safety. Don't take even those little motors for granted.

GARNET BULLETS

A cool fact about garnets is that they were actually used in ancient Asia and the American Southwest as bullets in guns. The strong, deep red of the stone was said to cause wounds worse than bullets. Read more about it on the Omnigems Blog -

Laser Welding

A question came up this week about how to solder some jump rings to hold blue topaz briolettes onto a necklace. We've all heard about ways to do some soldering close to a stone, and some of us have sized a ring without taking the stones out of their mounts. We've used wet paper towels, garnet sand, cooling gels, and my favorite of suspending the stone in a dish of water. All techniques bank on the principal of using a small, hot flame to do the job quickly before the stone gets hot enough to crack or change color.

But each job is somewhat of a gamble. Some stones are hardy and some are frail. Jades and jaspers will generally take a lot of heat, but I'd never chance it with the likes of topaz or opal. Trying to shield a stone from the torch is always a betting game, and sometimes you lose.

If you're worried about soldering something close to a stone, perhaps it's time to consider a no-heat method like laser welding. Most jewelry stores have laser welders these days, and the cost of having it done is quite affordable. They used to have problems doing silver, but now seem to do it routinely.

I've used a local shop twice in the last year, once for a piece with little emeralds a "friend" asked me to repair and for a second piece where I needed a safety catch and didn't want the torch heat to expose all the solder lines again.

World largest Meteorite Discovered in Permafrost

Moscow, AP, Iswestija

Russian scientists holding a press conference in Vladivostok yesterday made public the discovery of the "largest meteorite ever found intact on earth".

The meteoritic iron was uncovered during bauxite mining operations north of Vladivostok. Olga Tankova from the department of Mineralogy at the Vernadsky Institute in Moscow who is in charge of investigating the find told journalists: "The iron was found after excavating permafrost ground in the Sikhote-Alin Mountains 120 miles northeast Vladivostok for mining operations. When the machines worked at the ground a cliff collapsed and gave free a huge lump of iron.



Because the famous meteorite fall of Sikhote-Alin had happened only 45 miles further north from the site in 1947 the head of operations of STREANAG mining assumed the iron could be of meteoritic origin. This was confirmed last week as a team of the Vernadsky Institute arrived. With approximate dimensions of 16 by 10 by 8 feet the meteorite is the largest cosmic body ever discovered on earth. Its weight is estimated to be more than 450 metric tons.

"When the iron was first uncovered in the permafrost it had gun blue appearance, after several days it started to rust. We must now hurry to proceed with our investigation, before the meteorite starts to oxidize further. This is the discovery of a lifetime" said Tankova.

Buchanan Thunder Eggs May 25th through May 28th

After a wildly successful trip last September, again Rod, the rancher who owns the famous Buchanan thunderegg beds 20 miles east of Burns, OR will host a weekend dig for all rockhounds! The pits will be open to digging Memorial Day weekend Friday May 25th through Monday May 28th 2012. Plan on arriving at 8:00 AM for check-in at the gravel pit across the road each morning and getting up to the pits before 9:00 AM. You can dig as long as you like but you must check out and pay for your eggs at the bottom of the hill before dark. We will be digging with hand tools and Rod will be charging \$1.00/pound for eggs you dig and \$1.25/pound for already dug eggs - which is a very reasonable price for these much sought after thundereggs. There will also be many tons of already dug eggs for sale at the bottom of the ridge from each pit so if you can't or don't care to dig you can still shop among eggs from all the pits. We opened five pits last year and plan to have these open, and all will be freshly prepared and ready to dig for the weekend.

Rod is also planning on hosting a FREE BBQ dinner at least **Saturday** and almost certainly **Sunday** as well! He along with generous members of some local clubs will be supplying the main dishes so PLEASE bring side dishes and/or desserts, or plan on a donation toward the cost of food to show your appreciation. ANY help is appreciated - if you can bring something to BBQ (as long as it fits on the grill LOL). Also plan on bringing plates and silverware, chairs, and your own favorite beverages.

Access to the beds is by short dirt roads which are suitable for high clearance vehicles or SUVs. Be prepared to carpool since parking at the digs is extremely limited and passenger cars are definitely NOT suited for the road! Digging should be fairly easy; the best tools to bring are a pick, rock hammer, shovel, and buckets. Rod will do his best to get the pits cleaned out with a backhoe to prepare for our digging beforehand; about 5 pits are currently open from last year's trip and should be easy to dig with some cleanout and hand tools. Each of the Buchanan pits contains different types of eggs, so there is a huge variety available. Last year we found many eggs with beautiful pockets filled with fully terminated quartz crystals, lots with spectacular druzy quartz, botryoidal clear agate, some blue and pink opal, zeolite minerals, and other formations. Also eggs with agate "scenes" and fortifications are possible. For a hint of what you can find check out the photos I have posted on the web page above. Believe it or not, much better are available but I don't yet have photos posted.

We'll have signs posted on the road for the camping area and the pits. Dry camping is available across the road from the pits at a

Rockhound "CODE OF ETHICS"

I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without permission from the owner.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.

I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or safe places and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies.

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or Federation officer, Bureau of Land Management or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.

I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", I will use Good Outdoor Manners and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.

large, flat gravel pit area that is suitable for trailers and tents.

Those wishing for a “wilderness experience” can camp among the bountiful sagebrush anywhere on the rancher’s property (ask Rod or myself for directions). Other spots to camp are the Crane Hot Springs resort (electric, water, hot springs!) or the Burns RV park (all services), both less than 30 minutes from the beds. There are also a few BLM camping areas that you can use for a small fee (dry camping is free anywhere you are permitted to drive on BLM land). Other nearby rockhounding areas within an easy drive include Stinkingwater petrified wood, birch limbs and other wood, agate, plume agate, Burns obsidian, fossil leaves, and more.

Once again EVERYONE will be required to sign a liability waiver for the Mt. Hood Rock Club’s insurance policy which will cover us in event of an emergency (free of charge). You don’t have to be a rock & mineral club member to attend. Print this out and bring this to your next club meeting, email and call all your rockhound friends - we need a good turnout so the ranchers will be happy with the trip and invite us back again!

GPS coordinates of the camp and pits for are: 43.596 N -118.619 W

DIRECTIONS: From Burns: from the east end of town, travel 1 mile northeast on Hwy 395 (the Burns RV park is here on your right). Turn right at the junction with Hwy 20 and proceed exactly 20 miles east to the Buchanan store at milepost 154. Just before the store turn right onto Crane-Buchanan Road. Travel south to a 90 degree left turn after 3 miles. SLOW DOWN, the camp area and dig are less than ¼ mile immediately east of the big hill!
If you miss the turn at Buchanan, turn around at the rest area 1 mile to east.

From Crane Hot Springs – the resort is 25 mi. east of Burns, turn right onto Hwy 78 in town to milepost 25. Travel east to the hamlet of Crane, here turn north onto Crane-Buchanan Rd. and follow it just under 13 miles to the camp area & pits.

From Idaho and points east: From Nyssa OR, follow Hwy 20 for 111 miles west to Buchanan, turn left at the store and proceed as above.

UV Lights for sale at the May Meeting!

The club has purchased twenty multi-wave (long-wave, short-wave, and mid-wave) 4W ultraviolet field lamps that will be sold at the meeting in May. These are the same lamps that Phil Neuhoff demonstrated at the March meeting. The lamps come with a carrying case and a telescoping magnetic pole that allows the lamps to be used to survey the ground for fluorescent minerals without bending over! In addition, there will be a special fluorescent mineral sample provided with each lamp. We are offering these packages for \$95, which is \$5 less than retail. Single wavelength 4W lamps typically run \$40-\$45, and as Phil demonstrated do not perform nearly as well. Since you get all three wavelengths with each lamp, this product is clearly the best value for an introductory field lamp. Proceeds from the sale of these lamps will support the clubs scholarship program. The lamps will be for sale at the Building Fund table before the meeting.

Well, it is finally here, the new season of workshops. Are you ready to make a cab or two?




