Almost 100 minerals have been named after women. Some were mineral collectors. Others were scientists. Others were wives of scientists. Listed below are a number of minerals that were named after women.

Rosemaryite	Russian Mineralogist
Lindbergite	The discoverer of the element radium
Sklodowskite	A distinguished mineral collector. Her husband was Eugene.
Caresite	Wife of Professor Peter Wyllie
Sophiite	A French chemist
Carnotite	A Russian volcanologist and mineralogist
Marialite	A United States Geological Survey Scientist
Mcnearite	A mineral collector and dealer from Sudbury, Mass.
Rondorfite	Her full name was Maria Rosa von Rath
Olgite	A mineralogist and crystallographer from Switzerland



Two minerals were named after Marie Curie-Sklodowska (1867-1934), sklodowskite and curite (named after Marie and her husband, Pierre). The mineral cuprosklodowskite was originally thought to be a copper-bearing version of sklodowskite and so its name bears Marie's name.

Pierre and Marie Curie discovered the element radium.

The deep green mineral called *szenicsite* was discovered in Chile by Terry and Marissa Szenics. This mineral named was officially approved in 1994. The Szenics are American mineral collectors and mineral dealers. Szenicsite contains the elements copper and molybdenum. Marissa Szenics was born in 1950.

Dear Sir,

Issue of Concern: BLM's proposal to withdraw lands determined to be crucial to the survival of the greater sage-grouse from location and entry under the 1872 Mining Law, subject to valid existing rights.

The Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies (NFMS) has reviewed the <u>Record of Decision and Approved Resource Man-</u> agement Plan Amendments for the Great Basin Region, Including the Greater Sage-Grouse Sub-Regions of Idaho and Southwestern <u>Montana, Nevada and Northeastern California, Oregon, Utah</u>(ROD), September 2015, and determined that it did not address the recreational use of the land for rockhounding.

The NFMS has over six thousand members in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington and Northern Utah. It is one of the seven Regional Federations that makes up the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies (AFMS), which has approximately fifty thousand members.

NFMS members collect a variety of rocks and minerals in many areas the BLM has designated as excluded from the 1872 Mining Law. It is unclear in the ROD whether NFMS members and the public could continue to use these historical rockhounding areas to collect rocks and minerals in the sage grouse management areas. Many of these areas are identified in rock and gem hunting books, and people from all over the United States and overseas visit these areas each year.

It is our position that rockhounding as a recreational activity does not present a negative impact on the management of sage grouse. We request that rockhounding should be identified as a recreational activity in the ROD implementation plans allowing rockhounds and the public to continue collecting rocks and minerals in sage grouse management areas. We further request that collecting of rocks and minerals using hand tools should be allowed in the sage grouse management areas during seasons when sage grouse are not nesting.

The NFMS position is that blanket exclusion for filing a mineral claim under the 1872 Mining Law in a sage grouse management area is not reasonable land use planning. Claim holders are required to file a plan with the agency prior to disturbance of the area. This offers the agencies the opportunity to assess and manage the impacts to the sage grouse in the management areas.

The Northwest Federation of Mineralogical Societies would like the implementation plans to address the conditions under which mineral claims can be filed in a sage grouse management area and mitigations that would have to be in place for exploration or mining activities. Therefore, the NFMS requests the administrator to include language in the implementation plans for sage grouse management areas to allow for the collection of rocks and minerals using hand tools as a recognized recreational activity. In addition, the NFMS requests that the staking of mineral claims under the 1872 Mining Law be allowed with regulations covering mechanized extraction and exploration within the sage grouse management areas.

DEPTH GAUGE FOR DRILLING

Sometimes you need to drill a number of holes all to the same depth. One quick and easy way to do this is to wind some tape around the drill bit so that the tape just touches the part surface when the hole is deep enough.

You can set the depth either by measuring



from the tip of the drill to the tape or by drilling to the correct depth, leaving the bit in the hole, and wrapping tape around the bit at the surface level.

Note that a little extra tape left free on the end will blow away debris from the drilling.

CUTTING A BOLT Whenever you have to cut a threaded bolt shorter, it's often difficult to get the nut to thread back onto it. And the smaller the bolt, the more difficult it is to restore any distorted threads. The problem is easily solved with the use of a nut. Here's how I do it.



First, screw a nut onto the bolt before cutting it. Grip the bolt by the threaded section that is to be sawed off. Then saw the bolt to the desired length, taper the end with sandpaper or file, and unscrew the nut from the bolt.

Unscrewing the nut over the freshly cut end of the bolt will straighten out any damage that sawing and filing did to the threads. Gripping the bolt by the piece to be sawed off localizes any crushing damage to the piece that will be thrown away.
