REMEMBERING WITH LOVE

RANDY WAYNE BENSON

Randy W. Benson passed away August 24, 2017 surrounded by family.

Randy was born December 15, 1947 to William and Leona Benson. Randy was born with a congenital hip condition in his childhood years. He was put in a body cast; which he had to endure for approximately 18 months or so! Doctors indicated that he may never attain full use; however, as proven in years to come, you didn't want to issue Randy a challenge as he overcame extreme endurance tests in RE, Army, & Police.

Randy being born of identical twins and the family of the twins being a close unit, if one twin moved, the other usually followed frequently



through childhood. Many homes & many different locations over the years; brothers and cousins became very close due to relocation, anxiety, schools, etc. However, anxieties were overcome by Randy and another challenge was conquered.

Because Randy had lost a cousin in Vietnam, as soon as he was old enough he joined the army and volunteered to be a crew chief in Vietnam. He was prayed for extensively and miraculously survived three helicopter crashes.

After his three years in the army, Randy joined the Seattle police department. He could have retired on a medical while still in the academy since they blew out his knee while demonstrating a tactical move. He had many knee surgeries to patch his knee until he was ready to retire after 27 years on graveyard duty. While on the police force Randy used his spare time to rebuild engines, hunt, and attended college in paramedic and art classes.

With his multifaceted artist abilities, he was self-taught in many areas, to include being a superb lapidarian. His rock collection is extensive proving his love for Rockhounding.

Jan and Randy were fortunate enough to go on two cruises, Alaska being their favorite. They travelled to many states seeing unusual things and hunting for rock. Randy was Jan's cheerleader as she learned to wire wrap the many beautiful rocks he had cut, shaped, and polished. I had always wanted to learn about rocks and God provided the perfect person to teach her.

Preceded in death by his parents, Leona and Bill Benson, and his brothers, Terry and Craig.

Survived by his wife, Jan, son, Jacob, adopted children, Stephen and Chrissy, many cousins, and his Uncle Don Ben-

AFMS SAFETY MA	ATTERS:

- Oxalic Acid: No correlation between an acid's strength and its toxicity. Its toxic potential can be inhaled or
 - readily absorbed through the skin. Follow very strict safety measures to address oxalic's toxicity. Grindstone Safety: Do not sit or stand directly in front of a grindstone while one is starting the machine or shutting it down. Not wise to position oneself in front of it while it is running. The reason is that grindstones have the potential to break. Equipment guards do mitigate some of the risk potential but not all the risk.

A fancy sapphire is a gem-quality corundum that is any color other than red, blue, or colorless. The mineral known as *corundum* occurs in an infinite number of colors. When it is red, it is known as "ruby," when blue it is known as "sapphire," and when colorless it is known as "white sapphire." All other colors of gemquality corundum are "fancy sapphire."

Fancy Sapphire Sources

Sri Lanka, India, Myanmar, Thailand, and Australia have historically been important sources of fancy sapphire. Minor amounts have been produced in numerous other countries. In the United States, Montana has been a source of fancy sapphires for over 100 years. In the 1960s sapphire was named the "official state gemstone." That attention helped Montana sapphires of all colors attract the patronage of state residents and a steady stream of tourists and visitors.

During the past few decades, Africa has become an important source of fancy sapphires. Deposits in Tanzania, Kenya, Madagascar, Ethiopia, Nigeria, and other countries are pro

Natural Color in Corundum

Corundum has one of the greatest natural color ranges in mineralogy. It occurs in hues of red, orange, yellow, green, blue, pink and purple. This is a bit of a surprise because corundum is an allochromatic mineral. "Allochromatic" means that pure corundum (Al2O3) is colorless or white. Corundum of other colors is produced when trace amounts of other elements or defects in the corundum crystal lattice cause selective absorption of certain wavelengths of light.

The causes of color in ruby and sapphire are well researched and documented. Chromium is the primary cause of the red color of ruby and the color of pink sapphire. A combination of iron and titanium causes the color of blue sapphire.

The cause of color in the many hues of fancy sapphire is less well researched. Vanadium can cause a grayish blue to green color. Iron and a missing electron can produce a strong yellow color. Iron alone can cause a pale yellow color. Chromium with a missing electron can cause an orange color. Interactions between trace elements and lattice defects produce many other colors. The most popular colors are usually pure hues, such as red, orange, yellow, green, blue and purple. All of these, with the exception of emerald green, are found naturally in sapphire.

FOREDOM MAINTENANCE

If you have a Foredom flexshaft, it makes sense to check it over every so often to be sure it's running properly. But how to do that? You've probably lost the little booklet that came with the unit. Well, being the good company it is, Foredom has put together an extensive set of videos on how to do almost anything.

The series covers set-up, lubrication, replacing a sheath, motor maintenance, and handpiece maintenance. Few if any special tools are needed. You can watch the videos at <u>www.foredom.net/flexibleshaftmachinemaintenance.aspx</u> particularly under "Foredom Basics" or the "Foredom Shafting..." categories. Any repair parts needed are available on the Foredom site or from most jewelry supply catalogs.

JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy for putting a drop of flux, oil, or glue just where you want it. They have a length of small metal tubing coming out the top that lets you squeeze out very small drops.

I use one with a short length of tubing for oil when I'm sawing or when drilling harder metals like steel. Another bottle I found in a plastics store has a longer length of metal tubing on it. Plastics people use them for dispensing fast drying glues to join pieces of acrylic. The long metal tube let's you reach into tight places. Either of these is handy for flux at the soldering station.
