A New Geological Age Named:

Welcome to the Meghalayan! Scientists have been debating a new name for our current geological epoch, namely the "Anthropocene" to reflect human influence on our planet since 1950. While that name continues to be debated, one new name was officially announced in July by the International Commission on Stratigraphy: the Meghalayan age. To earn a name, a proposed geological age must have a marker in the rock record. This one's marker comes from oxygen isotopes in a stalamite from India. The Holocvene Epoch is now officially divided into three ages: Greenlandian (starting 11,700 years ago as massive continental glaciers retreated). Northgrippian (starting 8,300 years ago at the start of a renewed cooling trend), and Megahalayan)(starting 4,200 years ago with a drought that saw the decline of several ancient civilizations). 
YESTERYÉAR BY SANDY BLODGETT HISTORIAN

From December 1990 Northwest Newsletter by Jon Spunaugle

Idaho's earliest society was the Idaho Gem Club founded on May 28, 1935 and remains a leading organization in the state today with 76 members and was the host of the 1990 NFMS Convention and Show, and is scheduled to host the 1995 AFMS/NFMS combined show. In 1936, a society in Orofino, Idaho was begun as well as one in Kellog, Idaho. The Owyhee Mineral Society was founded in Caldwell, Idaho in the month of September, 1938, also one of the state's leading clubs.

From "A BIT OF HISTORY" By Laverne Williams, NFMS Historian, 1987

The annual (NFMS) convention which had been scheduled to be held at Boise, Idaho, in 1942 was cancelled for the duration of the war in compliance with the government request that only vital or necessary conventions be held during war time. Once WWII became past history, the 6th convention was held Aug. 31—Sept. 1, 1946 at Boise, hosted jointly by Idaho Gem Club, Owyhee Gem & Mineral Society, & Snake River Gem Club.

Midas Gold has certainly been rolling out a persistent were totally honest, they would just say that they stream of deceptive fantasies about their proposed Stibnite mining project for the last couple years. Not exactly outright lies, but very carefully worded half-truths regarding a project riddled with murky uncertainties.

To this end their public relations people have done an admirable job and are now claiming that there is strong local support for the project.

I'd characterize current public opinion more as strong that the mine is essentially a done deal and that ambivalence and skepticism with some modest support.

Much of that support may be based on misconceptions actively promoted by Midas, however. They have been claiming that the only way to fix the environmental problems left by previous mining operations is to allow Midas to "restore" the site by mining it yet again. It's a seductive fantasy that appears to have at least a whiff of plausibility.

As a former minerals administrator for the Payette National Forest who has spent a lot of time working at the Stibnite site and reviewing Midas' mining plans, I'd like to fill in a few blanks in the rosy picture that Midas has been pitching.

I used to give Midas the benefit of the doubt when they started submitting preliminary plans that included some measures to clean up existing contamination at the proposed mine site.

I had a good chuckle when they started referring to their mining plan (known as a Plan of Operations in the Forest Service) as a Plan of Restoration and Operations. OK, a little amusing "greenwashing" I thought to myself.

Surely everyone understands that this is a massive mining project that will leave multiple huge holes in the ground and entire valleys filled with waste rock, right? Wrong.

I patiently waited for Midas to submit their final plan that hopefully would detail exactly how they would pull off this remarkable have-your-cake-and-eat-it-too project. When they finally did, it turned out to be disappointingly inadequate.

The actual mining plan (which is available on the Forest Service website), proposes very little that would qualify as being "restoration" as most people understand the word. Interestingly enough, the term is not included in the extensive glossary of the plan. Just for the record. the common definition is: "the action of returning something to a former owner, place, or condition." This is not going to happen. If Midas

intend to "clean up" some of the existing environmental problems and leave it at that. What is left unsaid is that even larger environmental impacts will likely remain at the site after they are done with this round of mining.

In the long term this project is highly unlikely to be the win-win situation that Midas portrays it as.

I heard the sentiment expressed a while back rather than fight it, those in opposition should just try to make sure that the project is planned to be as environmentally benign as possible. If only that were possible.

Normally a reasonably thorough environmental analysis (including public input) of this complexity would require a good five years or so to complete. When I was still working during the early phases of this project I had the sense that Midas understood the time frame and was at least grudgingly accepting of it. All that changed when the current federal administration came into power.

Allow me to engage in a bit of predictive speculation (which of course Midas is welcome to refute) regarding the not-so-public relations going on behind the scenes currently. I suspect that Midas has now joined the ongoing federal deregulation feeding frenzy and is using every political means possible to get around existing environmental laws.

A little chat here and there with the right people and word will come down from Washington that the Payette National Forest shall have the required analysis completed in a completely unattainable time frame. This pretty much guarantees that it will be a piece of junk. Which should make for a slam-dunk successful legal challenge in court.


Normally a judge would tell the Forest Service to go back and do it right, but normal doesn't seem to apply much anymore, so one has to wonder where Midas' strategy leads from there. My guess is it will involve invoking "national security." Sounds crazy? Wait and see.

Midas might have good intentions, but I'm sure they would prefer to play political hardball rather than provide adequate supporting scientific evidence for their claims of "restoration."

Could Ogden, Utah, be in the cards as the new national headquarters of the Bureau of Land Management?

House Natural Resources Chairman Rob Bishop (R-Utah) plans to broach the subject at a formal committee roundtable discussion, set for tomorrow in Ogden, that will focus on the Interior Department's ongoing agencywide reorganization effort, and the likely move to relocate BLM's headquarters to a city in the West.

Interior Secretary Ryan Zinke has said he wants BLM to get out of Washington, D.C., and move out West, where the vast majority of the 245 million acres the bureau manages is located.

Zinke has said Interior is working to submit a report this fall to Congress outlining the process of moving the bureau's headquarters.

Cities in Colorado, New Mexico and Utah are believed to be on the short list of sites Interior officials are still evaluating.





SETTING A RIVET

Riveting is usually done with a cross peen hammer, but I've found it's a lot easier for me to hit the rivet wire when using a small ball peen - and the smaller the better. Shown here is one I typically use. It's about 3/8 inch diameter on the back of a chasing hammer, but I've been thinking that a 3/16 inch ball might be even better. Look for a yard sale hammer you can modify to work.

SHEET WAX WITH ADHESIVE

While shopping in the Los Angeles jewelry district for supplies for our class, I found a new product that may interest some of you. Often before casting, I want to increase the thickness of a model by adding a layer of wax on the back side. For instance, models like a leaf or a flower petal do not cast well unless you add a little extra thickness. The problem is trying to apply a coating of wax that's smooth and even.

The new product I found is an easily moldable sheet wax with an adhesive coating. This lets me easily add thickness to a very thin model. With a leaf, just press it onto the wax, trim excess wax around the outer edges, and then gently bend the sandwich to the contour you would like. The wax is available in a number of different thicknesses from about 26 ga to 14 ga.



"CODE OF ETHICS"

I will respect both private & public property & will do no collecting on privately owned land w/o permission from the owner.

I will keep informed on all laws, regulations, or rules governing collecting on public lands & will observe them.

I will, to the best of my Ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.

I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting specimens.

I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind such as fences, signs, buildings, etc.

I will leave all gates as found.

I will build fires only in designated or sage places & will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.

I will discard no burning material - matches, cigarettes, etc.

I will fill all excavation holes which may be dangerous to livestock.

I will not contaminate wells, creeks, or other water supplies

I will cause no willful damage to collecting material & will take home only what I can reasonably use.

I will practice conservation & undertake to utilize fully & well the materials I have collected & will recycle my surplus for the pleasure & benefit of others.

I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) & will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.

I will cooperate with field-trip leaders & those in designated authority in all collecting areas.

I will report to my club or federation officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational & scientific purposes.

I will appreciate & protect our heritage of natural resources.

I will observe the "Golden Rule", will use Good Outdoor Manners & will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the statue & Public Image of Rockhounds everywhere.
