

Dana asked for any corrections to the minutes of last meeting as printed in the Grindings. Willa Renken made a motion to accept the minutes as printed in the Grindings which was seconded by Deana Ashton. Board members voted, motion passed.

HISTORIAN REPORT

In May of 1967 Dudley Stewart organized the first gem stone study group. Dudley gathered 12 members who learned about garnet star orientation and the different colors and mineral content of garnets. He was considered to be the star garnet expert nationwide. They took a field



trip in June to the Gatfield Ranch in Montour, beginning a year of garnet exploration that culminated in a front page cover photo in the *Lapidary Journal* Gem Cutting Magazine. The photo featured a magnificent star garnet necklace with graduated size garnets. In February of 1967 Governor Samuelson signed the bill making the Idaho Star Garnet the official gem of the Gem State.

TREASURER NEEDED!





- 2. ROY (Rockhound of the Year): This is to honor an individual, couple, or Junior who has done something special for our club. Give your suggested nominee to any IGC Board Member. This first goes to NFMS then to AFMS.

- 5. Endowment fund raised \$6000 for AFMS Special Projects: Junior Badges, Judges training, Digitizing of slide programs, etc.

- 6. ALAA: It is our responsibility to promote our Recreational Rockhounding hobby to help keep public lands open. Websites of BLM & Dept. of Interior recognize rockhounding. Public education is about doing great public relations for Recreational Rockhounding!
- Conservation, Management, & Recreation Act became law on 3/12/2019: This affects Public Land Access for Recreational Rockhounding in all 50 states. (S-47 & the Law is 260 pages).

California affect: 118 Mil. Acres BLM Managed lands converted to wilderness areas including Hauser Geode Beds in Blythe, CA (East of LA, West of Phoenix, North of Yuma, & South of Lake Havasu City). No wheeled access or mechanical devices for collecting!

In Death Valley Nat. Pk., The National Park Service added 92,000 acres. Thus, PROHIBITING ROCK-HOUNDING.

In Joshua Tree Nat. Pk., The USFS increased wilderness areas to 7,000 acres. This is a total of 185,000 sq. miles for both of these areas!

Positive effects: 6 OHV areas cannot be changed in future legislation & Several WSA (Wilderness Study Areas) were removed and returned to public multi-usage with Recreational Rockhounding temporarily permitted!

BLM has 2 years to create mgmt. plan to include Recreational Rockhounding as Recreational Activity or lose access to collecting areas. This is why ALAA has started a program to compile a list of field trips by clubs & individuals listing # of people, roads used, & GPS Coordinates. The list will be used to provide proof of road usage and help prevent closure of areas. They are our compiled voice.

Currently 87 bills in Congress that may adversely affect your ability to exercise your right to collects Rocks, Minerals, & Fossils for your personal use.

BENCH TIPS by Brad Smith

EMERY BOARDS

The sanding boards for doing your nails are one of my favorite finishing tools. I use the ones with a thin foam core. They have enough resistance to sand just the high points off a flat surface and yet give a little when you're trying to smooth off a curved surface.

Plus they're inexpensive and come in a variety of grits. Some grits are so fine they give an almost finished surface. Pick up a few at a beauty supply company or at your local drug store.


OPALS

Dr. Phil Neuhoff, Geologist, is going to educate everyone on opals, from their composition to various ways to work with them. Lapidary artists will be on hand to show how they process rough opals into beautiful jewelry.

DENTAL FLOSS

When testing the fit of a stone in the bezel, it's all too easy to get it stuck. If tapping the finding or opening up the bezel a bit with a knife blade doesn't dislodge it, you might have to drill a small hole in the bottom and push it out with a needle.

To avoid all this frustration, use the old dental floss trick. Lay a piece of over the top of the bezel before you seat the stone. Then just pull on the string to remove the stone.


