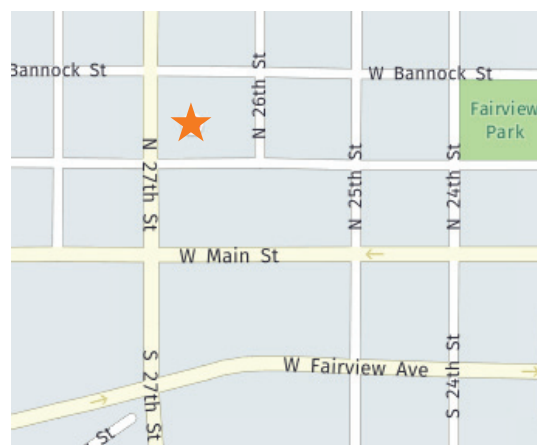

IDAHO RECREATION COUNCIL

IRC and its affiliates (including Idaho Gem Club) responds to revisions to the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) regulations and related processes. Recreational Rockhounding was included as activities requiring motorized access to Forest Service land as a result of the work your Federation Director is doing by being a member of the IRC. The response included items to preserve responsible motorized access to Forest Service land as an extremely high priority.

1. Efficiency is a priority for the agency, but not to undercut the analysis of roads and trails potentially for decommissioning.
2. The changes and additions to Categorical Exclusions should not be used to decommission and remove roads and trails unless there is exceptional reason supported by adequate analysis and public input.
3. If a site or structure on a site is to be decommissioned, a stricter analysis should be conducted and public comment should be incorporated.
4. Recreationists are volunteer trail managers that help to clear debris and maintain trails.
5. If a trail or road is the cause of sufficient ecosystem damage, sufficient steps should be taken to relocate the road or trail rather than decommission and close the trail or road.
6. The closing or decommissioning of trails and roads under a CE should be the call strictly between the agency and timber harvesting group. This excludes users who may benefit from a road or trail because they are not part of the group that is harvesting the timber in the area.
7. Weight and consideration of the economic analysis should be an integral part of determining the preferred action alternative.
8. IRC supports a cooperative approach to action determination through interdisciplinary preparation that includes local communities.
9. Public land should be made available to the public and at the very least the public should have the ability to participate in the process if a drastic change will occur.

Sept. 5, 2019, the Federation Director will attend a public meeting. It is a required meeting during the preparation state of the USDA Forest Service Sinker Creek-Boise Ridge Forest Health Project. This includes substantially reducing the miles of new temporary road construction and better describing the Riparian Conservation Area (RCA) delineation process and clarifying no treatments proposed for RCA.

Report for the USDA FS meeting regarding the

Slinker Creek-Boise Ridge Forest Health Project: It is a 10 year plan with no permanent road/trail closures planned. It will make 7 temporary roads to access the project areas skirting private owned land. This 10 year plan is divided into yearly plans with closures and re-opening each section after completion. On completion of each section, there will be new trails for public access skirting private lands and our forests will be healthier for prevention of wildfires!

AMERICAN LANDS ACCESS ASSOCIATION (ALAA)

This includes possible loss via closures for any reason to recreational rockhounding sites. I have included information regarding fires (around the state and Northwest areas) of possible rock hunting sites for your safety.

I realize this summer has been exceptionally high amount of correspondence regarding our local, state, and federal government dealings. I have tried to keep the information to a minimum. As I was on vacation for 3 months traveling to a different site most every day, I was careful when sending information to be sure I had a secure website to prevent hacking of your and my computer. Secure websites were not always available so the correspondence piled up: Therefore, you received several emails at a time. This can be cumbersome to the receiver and the sender.

To those of you who have decided to block my correspondence, I am sorry you have made a choice to lose out on timely NFMS and AFMS information in the coming months. You are welcome to talk to me individually or any Board Member about your problems with this form of correspondence and volunteer for this position. We who volunteer have a commitment to Recreational Rockhounding and public access sites remaining open to future generations. Commitment to your club is harder than joining another club. It is easier to give responsibility for the functioning of the club to others. Taking action or working with others takes more commitment. Volunteerism is a way to learn how to experience life. Star garnet brings national attention to state, gem shop

Stewart's Gem Shop is one of Boise's hidden treasures. You'll find it tucked away on Idaho Street near 27th in a funky off-North End residential neighborhood where it has been since 1956.

The shop is filled with everything from large polished stones, including jasper, and petrified wood, geodes with sparkling purple crystals, finely crafted jewelry with precious stones and a plethora of gemstones such as sparkling Idaho opals and rich red garnets.

But the prize for the shop's owner Eugene Stewart is the Idaho star garnet. The gem has been a Stewart family enterprise since 1951, when Eugene's father, Dudley, first found the silky garnet on a trip looking for clear garnets. It had been overlooked by miners and hobby lapidaries in the past. He started introducing it at gem shows and it has grown in popularity ever since.

When Eugene took over the business in the 1970s, he started marketing star garnets successfully on a national level.

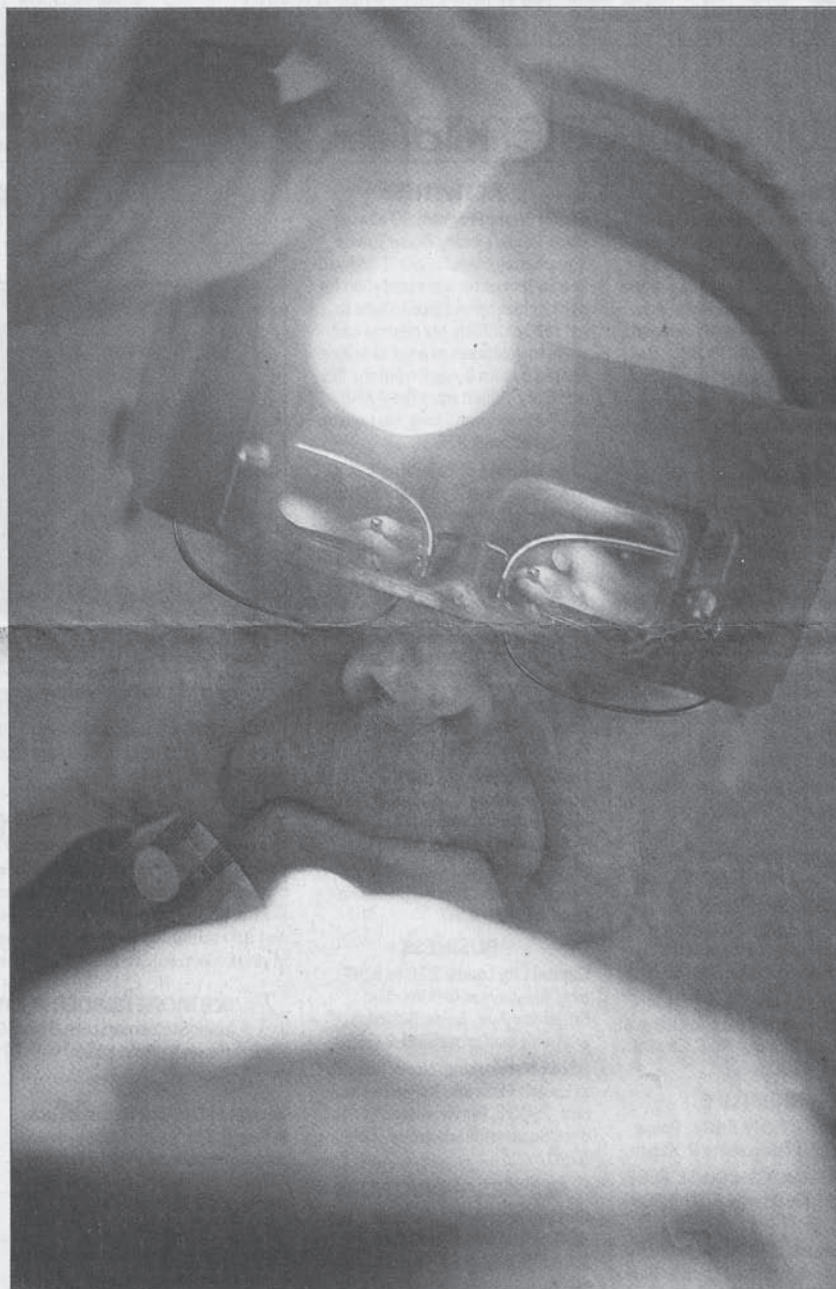
The stone and Stewart's shop will be featured Wednesday on the Travel Channel's "Best Places to Find Cash and Treasure." The show's crew and host Kirsten Gum dropped by Stewart's shop last summer after digging and sluicing for garnets along Emerald Creek in northern Idaho.

Here are five cool things to know about Idaho star garnets:

➤ **No. 1:** The stone ranges in color from red violet to deep purple, with a silky luminous surface highlighted by a bright silvery star.

➤ **No. 2:** Idaho designated

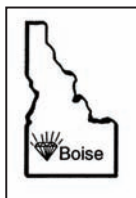
