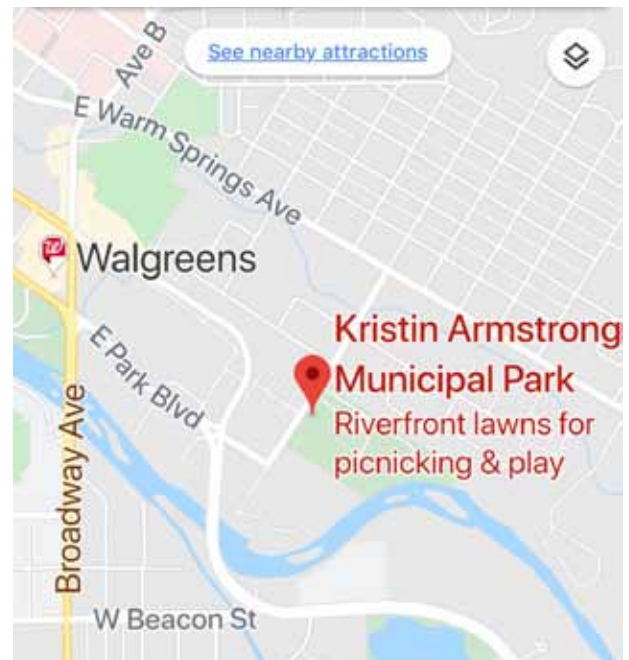
SPECIAL EVENTS

As some know from the last newsletter we visited Texas Springs early on in June and had a fun trip, but got rained out on Saturday. 2 weeks later we visited McDermitt, Nevada, for another exciting campout rockhounding adventure. 13 people joined us over the weekend.



We arrived in McDermitt on Friday to visit with Leanne at the Caldera Rock Shop. Leanne was very excited and willing to show us what the area could provide, as well as giving us some updated rockhounding maps. We were also invited to visit the operation they were working at the former Gary Green location. Several of us purchased some specimens and rough rock and we were off to setup camp.

The sun was shining with occasional clouds that were welcome as the desert was starting to warm in the late afternoons. Bob and Kim were a blessing to have along as they were familiar with the area and passed on a lot of what they knew and good locations to get some Petrified, Opalized, Bog Wood and many other cool rocks. We visited the Sagenite area as well and some took home some interesting specimens. There was no moon and clear sky's, leaving one to enjoy the non-polluted starlit night. On Sunday we did one last outing and found the sea life fossil area which provided some interesting specimens.

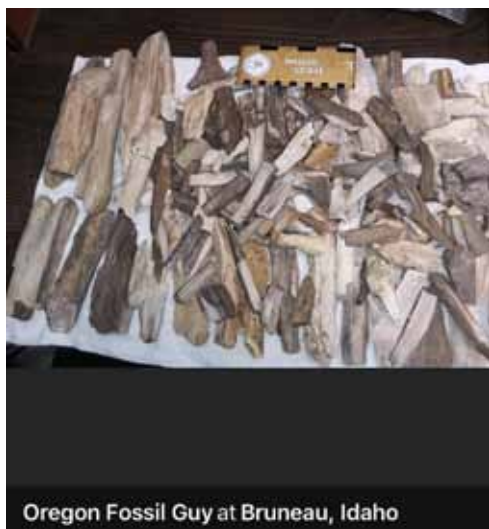

ARIZONA TREASURE FOUND!!

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — A bronze chest filled with gold, jewels, and other valuables worth more than \$1 million and hidden a decade ago somewhere in the Rocky Mountain wilderness has been found, according to a famed art and antiques collector who created the treasure hunt.

Forrest Fenn, 89, told the Santa Fe New Mexican on Sunday that a man who did not want his name released — but was from “back East” — located the chest a few days ago and the discovery was confirmed by a photograph the man sent him.

“It was under a canopy of stars in the lush, forested vegetation of the Rocky Mountains and had not moved from the spot where I hid it more than 10 years ago,” Fenn said in a statement on his website Sunday that still did not reveal the exact location. “I do not know the person who found it, but the poem in my book led him to the precise spot.”

Fenn posted clues to the treasure’s whereabouts online and in a 24-line poem that was published in his 2010 autobiography “The Thrill of the Chase.”

Hundreds of thousands have hunted in vain across remote corners of the U.S. West for the bronze chest believed to be filled with gold coins, jewelry and other valuable items. Many quit their jobs to dedicate themselves to the search and others depleted their life savings. At least four people died searching for it.

Fenn, who lives in Santa Fe, said he packed and repacked his treasure chest for more than a decade, sprinkling in gold dust and adding hundreds of rare gold coins and gold nuggets. Pre-Columbian animal figures went in, along with prehistoric “mirrors” of hammered gold, ancient Chinese faces carved from jade and antique jewelry with rubies and emeralds.

He said he hid the treasure as a way to tempt people to get into the wilderness and give them a chance to launch an old-fashioned adventure and expedition for riches.

Fenn told The New Mexican in 2017 that the chest weighs 20 pounds (9 kilograms) and its contents weigh another 22 pounds (10 kilograms). He said he delivered the chest to its hiding place by himself over two separate trips.

Asked how he felt now that the treasure has been found, Fenn said: “I don’t know, I feel halfway kind of glad, halfway kind of sad because the chase is over.”

“I congratulate the thousands of people who participated in the search and hope they will continue to be drawn by the promise of other discoveries,” he said on his website.

The National Park Service and National Fossil Day partners are sponsoring an art contest to celebrate the 11th annual National Fossil Day. The 2020 National Fossil Day celebration is scheduled for Wednesday, October 14, 2020, during Earth Science Week. The theme for this year's art contest is: "Life of the Paleozoic Oceans!" For this theme we would like contest participants to depict aquatic organisms from the Paleozoic oceans, particularly those found in the United States of America. The Paleozoic era (541 to 250 million years ago) was the earliest of the three geologic eras with diverse life, and is subdivided into six geologic periods: the Cambrian, Ordovician, Silurian, Devonian, Carboniferous, and Permian. The 2020 National Fossil Day logo features a wide variety of sea creatures that formed and lived within a 270 million year old Permian Reef from Glass Mountains and Guadalupe Mountains of Texas and New Mexico. Please see www.nps.gov/subjects/fossilday/art-contest-2020 for contest rules and requirements and an entry form.

AFMS CODE OF ETHICS

- I will respect both private and public property and will do no collecting on privately owned land without the owner's permission.
- I will keep informed on all laws, regulations or rules governing collecting on public lands and will observe them.
- I will, to the best of my ability, ascertain the boundary lines of property on which I plan to collect.
- I will use no firearms or blasting material in collecting areas.
- I will cause no willful damage to property of any kind — fences, signs, buildings, etc.
- I will leave all gates as found.
- I will build fires in designated or safe places only and will be certain they are completely extinguished before leaving the area.
- I will discard no burning material — matches, cigarettes, etc.
- I will fill all excavation holes, which may be dangerous to livestock.
- I will not contaminate wells, creeks or any other water supply.
- I will cause no willful damage to collecting material and will take home only what I can reasonably use.
- I will practice conservation and undertake to utilize fully and well the materials I have collected and will recycle my surplus for the pleasure and benefit of others.
- I will support the rockhound project H.E.L.P. (Help Eliminate Litter Please) and will leave all collecting areas devoid of litter, regardless of how found.
- I will cooperate with field trip leaders and those in designated authority in all collecting areas.
- I will report to my club or Federation officers, Bureau of Land Management, or other authorities, any deposit of petrified wood or other materials on public lands which should be protected for the enjoyment of future generations for public educational and scientific purposes.
- I will appreciate and protect our heritage of natural resources.
- I will observe the "Golden Rule," will use "Good Outdoor Manners" and will at all times conduct myself in a manner which will add to the stature and public image of rockhounds everywhere.

WIRE WORKING TIPS

Practice Wire: New to wire work? Sterling silver wire is lovely to work with, but unless you're made of money, don't use it to practice with. Use inexpensive craft wire or copper wire from the hardware store instead.

Ugly, Misshapen Loops? Practice makes perfect! The first time you try to make loops using round-nosed pliers your work will probably be ugly and misshapen.

Everyone makes ugly misshapen things at first. Don't get discouraged. Just keep practicing.

Here are some more loop-making tips:

- Use cheapie wire like copper or craft wire to practice with. You do not want to waste your expensive sterling until you become good at rounding the loops properly.
- Always remember to use a light touch when gripping the wire with your round-nosed pliers so you don't mar it too much.

Tip for tucking down little end pieces of wire:

If you have crimping pliers, they are perfect for squooshing down the little bend of wire when making a super basic wire headpin or pressing down the end of a wire after making a wrapped eyepin or beadlink.

Wire Bending Super Tip: This is the best tip ever. If you follow this rule, your work will improve by leaps and bounds:

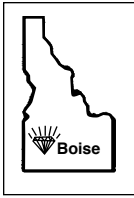
- Always bend the wire by using your FINGERS (usually the thumb) to press the wires against the or around the jaw of the pliers, rather than bend with the pliers. Why? If you use the pliers to do your bending, you'll get more plier-jaw shaped dents than are necessary. Try to keep the pliers as stationary as possible and you'll get better results. This is true not just for making loops, but for manipulating the wire in any way.

Opening and Closing Loops, Links, and Jumpings -

Always use a twisting motion with your plier holding hand (like twisting a doorknob) to open links, loops, and jump rings. If you pull the loop "out", you'll never be able to twist it back into shape.

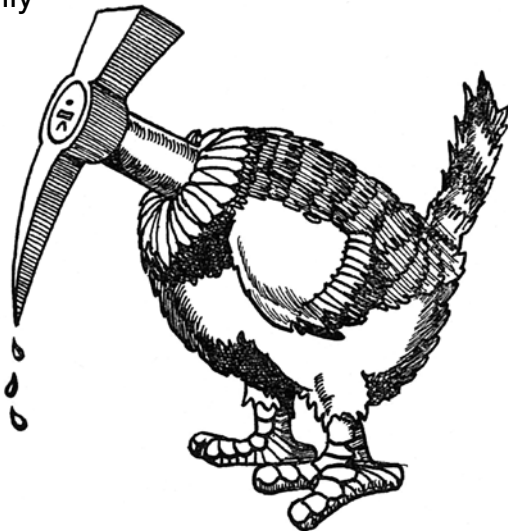
