APRIL FIELD TRIP REPORT

April Field Trip to Graveyard Point

On Sunday, April 25, the group of 14 people in 11 cars and trucks met at the Xtra Mile Gas Station at the corner of Hwys. 95 and 55. We had everyone sign-in on the log sheet for support for the maintenance on the club's claim. I will have to admit I was very concerned that we would be rained out with all the rain we had on Saturday and Sunday early morning. Don Dixon was confident we would have no problem, so we headed out. Don was correct. The weather was fantastic! It was surprising to see dust trails behind vehicles on the path to the claim!

Cheryl showed the group where our claim markers were so they would know where it was safe for them to go collecting. There was a short rain shower, but all it did was cut down on the dust.

At our April field trip we had 1 young man sign in and start the process of becoming our first "Future Rock Hound of America". Malachi chose the collection box that will hold 10 minerals or samples along with the Blue Collection Bag we are handing out for him to be able to keep his collection boxes in and transport them from home to meetings or school for show and tell. He had his rock bag, tools and a Grandma to fetch whatever he needed from the truck! Malachi found a good vein, and with a lesson from Don Dixon, they extracted a beautiful specimen. He also learned some chiseling and hammering techniques. This was not Malachi's first time rockhounding, he told me. He is working up the ranks with the production he displayed today!

Chris Berry discovered a boitroydial vug with promise and worked at getting that free, and he also shot a great video of the process!

Around 1:00, Don led us to a hillside down by Million Dollar Hill and we hiked finding little agate eggs. The weather held off and rain began just as we exited the entrance to the claim areas.

Special thanks to Don Dixon, who was an enormous help to all of us. We found a lot of pretty decent plume agate on the surface. Don's knowledge of the entire area is quite extensive and he was so helpful! He was appreciated by all who attended!

Thank you also to Robert Murphey for taking us to the Owyhee Gem and Mineral Society's Big Egg Claim on Saturday! There were some real big eggs pulled out! It was nice to join up with the Owyhee club and have access to different materials!



MAY FIELD TRIP

Idaho Gem Club Field trip day is the 3rd Sunday of each month and Owyhee Gem & Mineral Society Field trip day is the 3rd Saturday of each month.

The field trip for May will be a weekend trip to the Burns area to collect Hampton Butte green petrified wood, then to Glass Buttes for obsidian.

We will meet at the first Rest Area just over the Oregon border by Ontario at 6 am on Friday, May 28. It will be a three hour drive to Burns, with some members staying at America's Best Value motel on Oregon Ave. On Saturday morning, May 29th, meet at the Burns McDonald's at 10 am. HAMPTON BUTTE

Hampton Butte has long been a popular collecting site for rockhounds who are interested in finding petrified wood with a unique green color. The 120-acre rockhounding area, located 12 miles northeast of Highway 20 near the unincorporated community of Brothers, is listed on the Central Oregon Rockhounding Map.

The specimens here are white, gray, black, and yellow but the most prized ones range from turquoise to dark green colors that are probably caused by iron or copper inclusions. The wood appears as petrified wood or limb casts where original structures were replaced by agate, jasper, or common opal. Agate and jasper can be found here as well.

This site has been visited frequently by rockhounds in past years but you still can find tumbler-size materials on the surface. Digging one to two feet below the surface with a shovel or pick would yield larger pieces of wood. The soil is relatively soft. Avoid digging under trees and around tree roots. Not every piece you find will polish well, there are a lot of porous materials.

The site is surrounded by BLM lands on the north and east with private property on the west and south. A beautiful Juniper forest covers Hampton Butte offering a great rockhounding and camping experience in the shady area. The site is extremely popular because of easy access and the great materials found here.



GLASS BUTTES

Glass Buttes are a group of volcanic mountains made up of two prominent peaks and several smaller hills. They are located in the remote northeast corner of Lake County, approximately 70 miles (110 km) southeast of Bend and 50 miles (80 km) west of Burns. Rising high above the high desert plain, the buttes are an important landmark in an area once known as the Oregon's Great Sandy Desert. The buttes are named for the numerous large deposits of obsidian found on their slopes. Today, most of the mountains and surrounding land are administered

by the Bureau of Land Management.

The mountains offer a number of recreational opportunities including rock collecting, hiking, camping, and hunting.



The highest point in the Glass Buttes complex is known as Glass Butte. Its elevation is 6,388 feet above sea level. The buttes are steep with a number of massive basalt outcroppings scatter along the slopes. There is a secondary peak southeast of the main summit called Little Glass Butte that has an elevation of 6,155 feet.

There is a wide variety of high-quality obsidian found in the area including jet black, brown, green, red fire, pumpkin, mahogany, midnight lace, rainbow, gold sheen, silver sheen, and snowflake as well as several double flow varieties. While some rockhounds dig for preferred obsidian specimens, there are large fields of colorful obsidian readily available on the ground for easy collection.

Today, most of the land on and around Glass Buttes is owned by the US Government. Those Federal lands are administered by the BLM. Because the Glass Buttes complex has abundant, high-quality obsidian, the Bureau of Land Management has reserved 36 square miles as a free-use area where the public can gather obsidian for



private use. No permits are required; however, individuals can only remove 250 pounds (110 kg) of obsidian per year. There is also some state-owned land and a few private obsidian claims in the Glass Buttes area that are not generally open to the public.

The area is very remote and extremely rugged. The access roads are not maintained so four-wheel drive vehicles are recommended. Also, the widely dispersed natural glass (obsidian) increases the chances of a flat tire on the roads.

NOTES FROM PRESIDENT ABOUT CLAIMS

Please remember that the Whangdoodle Claim requires active Idaho Gem Club membership to collect or dig. Have your current club ID card with you. Non members may not dig there! Contact club officers to report any activity you see on the claim. Get a license plate number or photo if possible.

We are guests of the Owyhee Gem and Mineral Society when we visit their claims on field trips, such as the Big Egg Claim. You may not return to rockhound without permission from an OGMS officer. Please observe this rule and conduct code.

Graveyard Point has several mining operations underway at this time! DO NOT show up and interrupt their activity without permission from the claim owner! The presence of an excavator makes for tremendous responsibility and liability! They are on limited time at a high cost per hour. They will let us know when we can see what this year yields and make purchases! The majority of Graveyard Point is under active claim by many miners, including the IGC Graveyard Point claim.

Checked Whangdoodle again and more digging is going on.

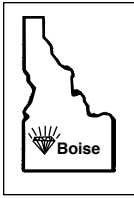
New Business:

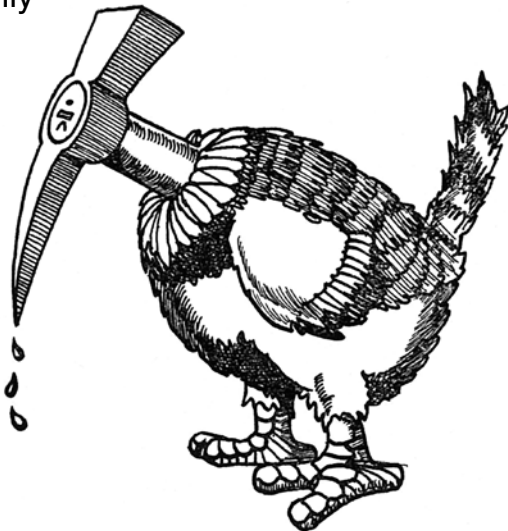
