THE "IDAHO CUT"

The legacy of Quincy Douglas Howell, founding member of the Idaho Gem Club, has been honored with the designation of an official state cut for faceted gemstones that he patented. He was a remarkable man who served as a WWII Air Force Offier and later became one of the top five experts in the faceting world. He named his most prized patent the "Idaho Cut."

Mr. Howell's family was supported by Senator Lori Den Hartog and Representative Megan Blanksma in adding the amendment of a new section to the Idaho Code. Senate Bill No. 1311 can be seen at TheIdahoCut.com/sb1311/ along with photos.

DINOSAUR BONE FOUND IN SOUTHEAST IDAHO

A dinosaur bone recently discovered in Idaho has been identified as the thigh bone of a very small T-Rex ancestor. It was found by an ISU paleontologist in southeastern Idaho, and was published in a paper in the Journal of Paleontology. It is the first dinosaur bone found in this area of Idaho and is believed to come from the Cretaceous period.

There are several kinds of dinosaurs that we have found fossils of in Idaho. Most of these finds have been in the areas that border Wyoming in the Tin Cup Formation. The kinds of dinosaurs that have been found are:

Notosaurs — A primitive kind of ankylosaurus; the "ball-tailed armored tank" kind of dinosaurs. Found in the Tin Cup Creek area.

Protoceratops — A very primitive Ceratopsian from the Gray's Lake area.

Tenontosaurus — A large sauropod with a very long tail. Known as a "sinew lizard." A herbivore, they were the favorite food of the deinonychus.

Deinonychus — Where there is food we need to look for their predators. A Deinonychus toe bone was discovered here recently.

Marine Lizards — At the same time the dinosaurs lived, there were ichthyosaurs or huge marine lizards in the oceans of the Earth and Idaho. The remains of two different types have been discovered here.

Shastosaurus merriami — These creatures' remains were found near Lewiston. The find changed the range of where Shastosaurus merriami was thought to live. No one knew that this ichthyosaur had lived beyond Northern California.

Cymbospondylus — This ichthyosaurs' remains were found near Georgetown, near the Utah border in Bear Lake County by Greg McDonald. He was once head paleontologist at Hagerman Fossil Beds National Monument.

Ammonites — Ammonites were the favorite foods of ichthyosaurs. They were jet-propelled, ocean going, large, shelled animals. There were many species that lived in the oceans to the west of Idaho.

DINOSAUR EXHIBIT AT DISCOVERY CENTER

SUE the T. rex will be in Boise from May 27th to September 4th, 2022

SUE the T. rex is the most complete, best-preserved Tyrannosaurus rex ever discovered. The Discovery Center of Idaho has partnered with the Micron Foundation to host a special exhibition featuring the latest scientific discoveries about this incredible fossil. Visitors will get to explore the sights, sounds, and smells of SUE's world, see casts of real dinosaur fossils, and come face to face with an exact cast of SUE's skeleton.

SUE's actual fossils are on permanent display at the Field Museum in Chicago, so the traveling exhibition gives people a chance to experience one of the biggest T. rex specimens ever found. The exhibition features an exact cast of SUE's skeleton, measuring in at 40 feet from snout to tail and 13 feet tall at the hip. Visitors will be able to see a lot more than just SUE's skeleton, though. New interactives and digital technologies will highlight the latest scientific discoveries and show people what SUE's world was like.

I visited SUE when the traveling exhibition was in Idaho Falls. It is really amazing to get an up-close perspective into the actual size of this animal. It is definitely an exhibit worth visiting while you have the chance!



FOSSIL LOCATIONS TO VISIT IN IDAHO

Clarkia Fossil Beds

This is one of Idaho's better fossils sites. It is located near the town of Clarkia in Northern Idaho, and has some exceptional leaf fossils that date back 15-million years. If you visit the area, check out nearby Emerald Creek, where Idaho's famous star garnets are found. 52743 State Highway 3, Clarkia, ID

Hagerman Fossil Beds

The state's most famous fossil site is definitely the expansive beds located in Hagerman. Over 200 different animal species have been identified here. A complete skeleton of the Hagerman Horse is on display at the visitors center. There is no digging allowed here, but its worth a visit to learn about this unique fossil site. 17970 US-30, Hagerman, ID

Minnetonka Cave

This fascinating limestone cave is located in southeast Idaho near Bear Lake. It is over 1/2 mile deep and is full of amazing stalactites and stalagmites. Just exploring the cave is worth the visit itself, but fossil lovers will appreciate that there is also lots to see. This was once a warm water environment which harbored various coral species. Evidence of these ancient critters can be seen throughout the cave.

Tolo Lake Wooly Mammoth

Perhaps the most impressive single fossil find in Idaho history would have to be the discovery of a complete wooly mammoth near Tolo Lake by Grangeville. The find was made by state workers in 1995, when a huge bone was spotted while doing work at the lake. Further excavation resulted in a complete skeleton. A total of 3 wooly mammoth and 1 early bison skeletons were recovered from the site. There is a complete replica of the mammoth on display along the highway just outside of Grangeville.

Malm Gulch Petrified Forest

Another place where you can take a glimpse into the past is at Malm Gulch just south of Challis. Here you will find an ancient petrified forest that once existed. 50-million years ago, the climate was much more like you would see along the Pacific Coast. Large coniferous trees grew. Now, the area is a desert, but a few petrified tree trunks still exist.

Highway 75 South of Challis.

As with any type of rockhounding or mining, you need to know who's land you are on. Private lands, state, federal (BLM, Forest Service, National Parks, etc.) will all have different rules. Collecting is not allowed in many locations.

Generally, on BLM and Forest Service lands (which covers 2/3 of Idaho) you are allowed to collect modest quantities of invertebrate fossils (corals, leaf plates, snails, mollusks, etc.) for personal use. These specimens cannot be sold for profit. Petrified wood can be collected up to 25 pounds per day, plus 1 larger piece. A total of 250 pounds can be collected in a year.

When a class of fifth graders started a geology unit in their science class, it led to a goal of getting a state rock designated for Illinois. Illinois had a state mineral (flourite), but no state rock. The students did a lot of research and came up with a list of three rocks that were easily found in Illinois and were used by many people: limestone, dolostone and sandstone. Part of their research included speaking with geologists, rock collectors, and gem clubs in the state to get the experts' views. The effort grew to include not only the local school district, but districts throughout the state, as well as other rock enthusiasts.

Their teacher created a website to provide details, a picture of each rock and a voting platform. You can see it at http://sites.google.com/d107.org/illinois-state-rock/ home. The students wrote letters to their legislators to gain support for their project. U.S. Rep. Sean Casten helped them and brought it to the floor of the House. They also posted signs around the school urging everyone to vote.

The winning rock is Dolostone. It won the vote because people like the way it looks, it is part of the bedrock under the state, and it is used in many buildings. It was made official on June 6 of this year when the governor signed the bill.

Deana asked for any corrections to the minutes as printed in the *Grindings*. Willa made a motion to accept the minutes, which was seconded by Rick. Board members voted, motion carried. **Treasurer Report** by Teresa Nebeker: Teresa needs a copy of the club's assets list from Sandy. The original cost of the old flourescent lights should be in the records.

Teresa went with Deana to Carol Caughins' house to see the donation material she wants to give the club. There are 41 tubs and buckets of her husband's collection with lots of local material. It is to be used for auctions in July and August, as well as other club auctions. There are also 18 small containers of polished rock.

Teresa also went over the monthly financial statements. **Secretary Report**: Just junk mail this month.

Workshop Report: The polisher was not damaged after all. The part was put on crooked and caused vibration. There were no workshops over the 4th weekend.

New Business: Willa and Teresa have researched earning income for the Scholarship Fund. There is a fund called IBond Treasury Market that we could invest a maximum of \$10,000 from the General Funds into an account that will earn 9.62% interest, or \$1,000 per year in interest income. The account is tied up for 5 years, after which it can be taken out and put into the Scholarship Fund. The account must be closed to withdraw funds and another account opened if we want to continue. It will need an account monitoring person that is trustworthy. Terri Frostrom and Jason Smith volunteered to be manager. The account pays interest every 6 months.
